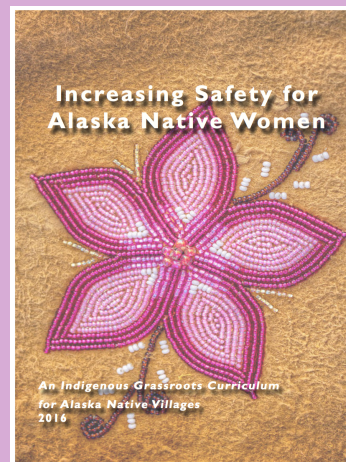

Four Pilot Trainings of Indigenous Alaska Native Curriculum on Domestic Violence

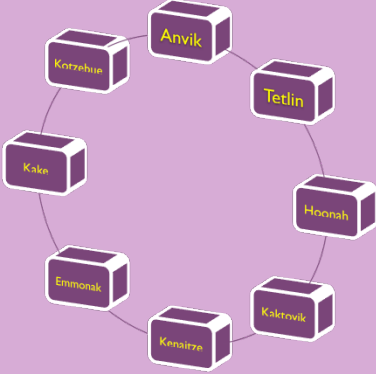

Development of an Alaska Native Domestic Violence Video Curriculum

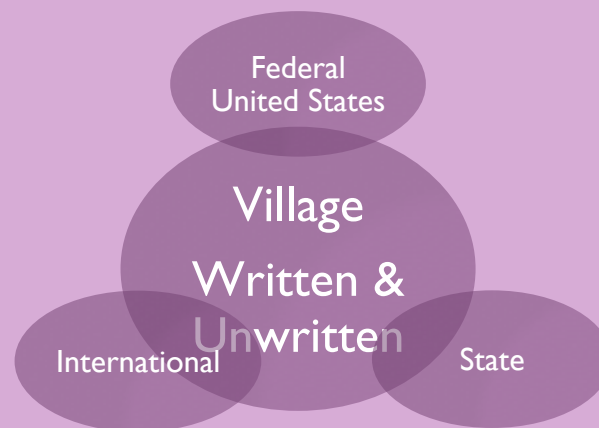
- Create an Alaska Native Curriculum on domestic violence that is indigenous to Alaska Natives not the lower forty-eight or other peoples.
- Community Engagement - Based on our collective knowledge of our villages, experience of domestic violence, and our experiences as Alaska Native women.
- This approach is a grassroots process of increasing the self-reliance of villages, given the reality that most villages lack resources to address the current epidemic of violence against Native women.

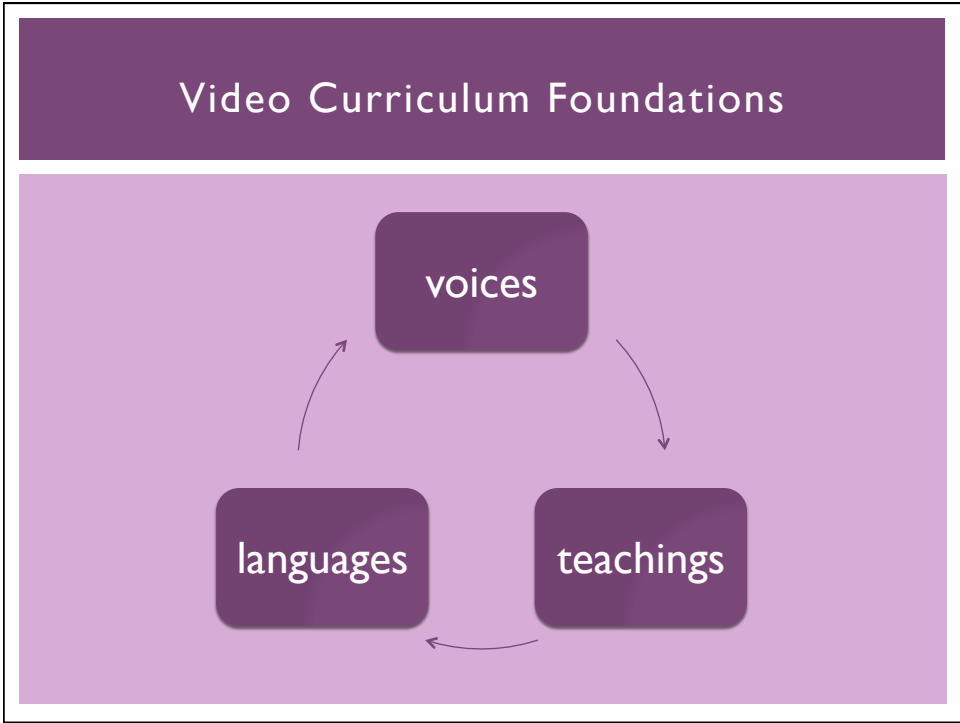
Organizing & Facilitating a Process of Discussion & Engagement

Facilitating a discussion within village/s to:

- Provide victims with pathways to safety
- Increase the accountability of abusers
- Increase the village response to domestic violence
- Determine changes needed within the village to increase village-wide responses to domestic violence.

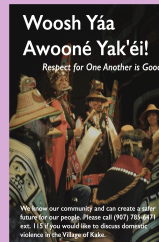
